

Quick Guide: Why LPAs Are a Vital Part of Estate Planning

What is an LPA and why is it important?

- While wills deal with affairs after death, Lasting Powers of Attorney (LPAs) cover what happens if you lose mental capacity during your lifetime.
- Without an LPA, loved ones face delays and legal hurdles just to manage your finances or care.
- LPAs help protect your lifestyle, wellbeing, and assets if you're no longer able to make decisions.

What does an LPA do?

- **Grants legal authority** for someone (your "attorney") to make decisions on your behalf if you lose capacity.
- Without an LPA, access to finances (even joint accounts) may be frozen, and family must apply to the Court of Protection—a costly and time-consuming process.

The two types of LPAs:

1. Property & Financial Affairs LPA

Manages bank accounts, bills, property, and investments.

2. Health & Welfare LPA

o Covers medical decisions and day-to-day care.

What if someone has already lost capacity?

- Unfortunately, it is too late to create an LPA once someone loses capacity.
- Somebody (usually a family member) must **apply to the Court of Protection** for a Deputyship Order expensive, slow, and not guaranteed approval

What is the OPG?

- The Office of the Public Guardian (OPG) is the government body that registers all LPAs.
- LPAs **must be registered** with the OPG before they can be used.



How to set up an LPA with APS (Step-by-Step)

1. Initial meeting with APS Associate for tailored advice and agreement to proceed



2. APS legal team drafts documents after receiving instruction form



3. **Drafts reviewed** by APS Associate and sent to client for approval (within 10 working days)



4. On approval, **signing process begins** (client, attorneys, certificate provider, and witnesses)



5. Signed documents are sent back to APS for registration with the OPG



- 6. Once registered, documents are either:
 - o Returned to you, or
 - Stored securely by APS (recommended)
